Title Conditional Multivariate Reference Regions

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Description An R package for estimating conditional multivariate reference regions. The reference region is non parametrically estimated using a kernel density estimator. Covariates effects on the multivariate response means vector and variance-covariance matrix, thus on the region shape, are estimated by flexible additive predictors. Continuous covariates non linear effects might be estimated using penalized splines smoothers. Confidence intervals for the covariates estimated effects might be derived from bootstrap resampling. Kernel density bandwidth can be estimated with different methods, including a method that optimize the region coverage. Numerical, and graphical, summaries can be obtained by the user in order to evaluate reference region performance with real data. Full mathematical details can be found in <doi:10.1002/sim.9163> and <doi:10.1007/s00477-020-01901-1>.

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ACE

Alternating Conditional Expectation (ACE) algorithm

Description

This function implements Alternating Conditional Expectation algorithm (ACE, Hastie and Tibshirani, 1990). This is a bivRegr's inner function for estimating variance, and correlation models.

aegis

A Estrada Glycation and Inflammation Study (AEGIS) Data

Description

The aegis dataset was obtained from the Estrada Glycation and Inflammation (AEGIS) project. A cross sectional, population based study that was performed in the municipality of A Estrada (Galicia, NW Spain). The study objective was to investigate the association between glycation, inflammation status, lifestyle and common diseases, and reasons for glycemc markers discordances (Gude et al., 2017).

id Anonymized patient identifier.

gender A factor variable describing patient gender, (female, and male).

age Patients' age.

hba1c Glycated hemoglobin percentage.

fru Fructosamine concentration (mg/dL).

Bivariate reference region estimation

Description

This functions estimate a probabilistic/reference region for bivariate data. It is based on a kernel density estimation. It may be applied to a set of bivariate data points, or to a bivRegr object. In the former case, the function will estimate a bivariate reference region for the model standardized residuals.

Description

This function estimates the covariates effects on the means vector, and variance covariance matrix from a bivariate variable. Non linear effects might be estimated for continuous covariates using penalized spline smoothers.

Hcov

Kernel bandwidth selection method based on bivariate density contours coverage

Description

This function implements a method for estimating bivariate kernel bandwidth based on data coverage. The method starts with the plug in estimate (which usually overfits the data), and then increase this bandwidth value until the desired coverage is obtained. Region coverage is evaluated in an out sample design, using a k fold cross validation scheme.

In the Martinez Silva et. al (2016) the non linear effects of the continuous covariates are estimating through polynomial kernel smoother, in this package we implement the same methodology but using penalized splines in order to reduce computational cost.
